Congratulations on your graduation of the Master of Public Health in Global Health (MPH) Course at TMDU!



The Degree Commencement Ceremony for AY2020 has been held.



On Wednesday, March 17, 2021, the TMDU Graduate School's Degree Commencement Ceremony took place under a warm spring sun and blue sky. A total of 293 graduates (128 for a master's and 165 for a PhD degree) received a degree in their respective fields of study, and a commencement message from President Tanaka.

This was the third Degree Commencement Ceremony for the MPH Course, which began in April 2018.

Q1

Since I was in the biomedical laboratory science department at TMDU, I have long had a strong interest in the relationship between medicine and society. Primarily, I wanted to learn more about "health" from a broader perspective, such as social determinants of health. When I heard that TMDU had established the MPH course, I thought it was a perfect opportunity and decided to enroll in this course.


Q3
